Candidates Forum October 16th!

NETC is sponsoring a Candidates Forum October 16th, 6:30pm at Meeker Middle School's Commons (lower level, north entrance off parking lot entered from 45th St. NE). At this writing, the following candidates have confirmed participation:

- 9th US Congressional district: Adam Smith and Doug Basler
- 27th Washington Legislature district: Laurie Jinkins, Steven Cook (Roger Deskins invited, Jake Fey has conflict)
- Pierce County District Court Position 8 (the only contested race): Jeanette Lineberry and Karl Williams
- Tacoma Municipal Court Position 2 (the only contested race): Rob Freeby (Drew Henke has conflict)

We'll also review the state initiatives on the ballot, and Tacoma's Charter Review proposed amendments.

To ensure non-partisanship in the proceedings, the League of Women Voters of Tacoma-Pierce County will moderate. Start writing down your questions now, so you don't forget them!

Pierce County Elections Office will be mailing county voter's pamphlets on October 9th. In the meantime, you can find on-line copies of the county and state pamphlets on the P.C. Auditor's website: <http://www.co.pierce.wa.us/index.aspx?NID=3172>. The state one has Congressional and Legislative positions, as well as statewide initiatives. It also describes the advisory (non-binding) votes an earlier initiative requires for laws passed by the last legislature that affect taxation. The law will not be affected by the advisory vote – it's an opportunity to let your legislative representatives know how you feel about the law and their support or opposition. The county guide has local races, including judges, and the Tacoma Charter Review amendments (there are 12 proposals).

We recommend that you use the voter's pamphlets to look at background and positions from candidates. There are also descriptions and for and against statements for the three state initiatives (two related to regulation of gun sales, including required background checks, and one calling for reduced school class sizes) and Tacoma City Charter amendments. Tacoma City Charter amendments range from cleaning up language to conform with state law and gender neutrality to making City Council emergency ordinances effective when passed, not a day or two later when they are published in the newspaper of record.

This session will be a timely and excellent opportunity to listen to and question candidates before completing your ballot and mailing or dropping it off. Ballots can be dropped by 8pm, November 4th in the back end of the Tacoma Police substation parking lot (corner of Northshore Parkway NE and Norpoint Way, next to the Center at Norpoint).

NE Tacoma Crime News

Www.tacomacime.org shows numerous crimes during September and October to date: burglaries/breaking and entering, car thefts, thefts from vehicle (break-in), simple assaults (likely domestic), and vandalism, and an impersonation. The site is useful for seeing what kinds of things are going on, especially in your immediate neighborhood, but it tends to exaggerate some crime reports because of the simplicity of the description possibilities. For example, minor property theft often gets reported as a burglary, which we would usually associate with a house burglary with more major property theft.

EIS Scoping Underway for PSE LNG Plant

The city kicked-off the EIS Scoping process for the proposed PSE liquefied natural gas (LNG) plant on September 24th, with a brief explanation of the Environmental Impact Statement process and an open house. The City's planning lead on this project, Shirley Schultz, made a few remarks about the EIS process, and then the meeting became an open house with multiple displays up to see what and where the project entails, and with knowledgeable people to discuss issues. Schultz outlined possible timing of the EIS process, which has to be completed and accepted before permitting can begin: draft by end of 1st quarter 2015, finished/approved by end of 2nd quarter.

There has been a public comment period on the EIS Scoping through October 13th. NETNC will submit comments and questions based on its understanding of the issues from the discussions with PSE and the City to date. Key points of NETNC's letter address: emergency response, visual and aural pollution (light, intrusive structures, noise, etc.), and power sources for plant operation.

A major issue that must be addressed is emergency response. Tacoma Fire is already studying the issues (for the methanol plant, as well, which is still evaluating possible show-stoppers, and not in EIS planning yet).

Ian Munce, the Special Assistant to the Planning Director, informally outlined a study that the City is doing to figure out how to much better respond to emergencies in the Tideflats, including most-importantly, gaining access for responders all over the Tideflats in spite of heavy truck traffic and rail movements. This \$600K Emergency Response/ Intelligent Transportation System study, supported by PSE, Targa Sound Terminal, US Oil Refining, the Puyallup Tribe, and other City agencies, responds to concerns that NETNC has raised in general over the years – this study is very good news. NETNC's letter to the city will endorse the ER/ITS study as long overdue, and encourage early follow-up on its recommendations.



Metro Parks' Public Hearings on Planning for 2014 Bond Projects

On April 22, Earth Day, registered voters in Tacoma, Browns Point and Dash Point supported Metro Parks Tacoma's 2014 Neighborhood Parks & Zoo Improvements and Safety Upgrades Bond. The measure passed with a nearly 65% approval rate.

Because of this, residents will see park and facility improvements and updates continue through 2024. Improvements will build upon the success of projects constructed with funding from the \$84M bond passed in 2005.

The 2005 bond included over 150 projects, most notably the Pool at Kandle Park, Master Plan development of Swan Creek Park, Wright Park renovation, opening of the South Tacoma Activity and Recreation (STAR) Center, and development of 10 spray grounds district-wide. Through grants, donations, and partnership opportunities Metro Parks Tacoma was able to raise an additional \$51M for expanded capital improvements. In our area, the Norpoint playground and spray park, and Alderwood play area were created. Planning is nearing completion for improvements at the Browns Point Lighthouse Park.

Currently, a 10-year approach to the 2014 bond projects is being mapped out. Timing of projects will be based on what needs are most critical, what timing helps achieve additional funding, and how we can work on improvements in every area of the city.

The Park Board will be approving the 2015/2020 Capital Improvement Plan, which will show the first 6 years of projects, and the 2015-2016 Capital Budget when the biennial budget is adopted this fall.

Applications for 2015 Arts Projects Funding Now Available

The City of Tacoma is now accepting Arts Projects funding applications from eligible organizations producing publicly accessible arts programming within Tacoma city limits in 2015. Arts Projects funding ranges from \$1,000 to \$5,000, and supports community projects that focus on the arts. The application deadline is 5 p.m. on October 31, 2014.

Past funding has supported a variety of projects including, but not limited to, arts components of festivals; arts workshops; dance, theater, and music performances; youth-focused arts programming; arts-focused cultural and historical events; exhibits; and literary events. Funded events must take place between Jan. 1, 2015 and Dec. 31, 2015.

Eligibility extends to private non-profit agencies with an IRS 501(c) not-for-profit designation; organized groups of community volunteers, such as a business district or neighborhood council with an advisory body, business license and organizational bank account; and educational

institutions or for-profit businesses wishing to produce not-for-profit arts functions. Applicants are required to have offices within Tacoma or, if they have no office, a majority of the applicant's activities must take place within Tacoma city limits. Other eligibility requirements apply. [See guidelines for complete terms.](#)

Funding for Arts Projects is determined through a competitive application process. Actual contract amounts will be based upon availability of funds and the review of each application as measured against evaluation criteria detailed in the guidelines.

Organizations interested in applying for Arts Projects funding can read about past funded projects and download the guidelines and application form on the 'Funding' page of ityoftacoma.org/arts. Application forms are also available by calling (253) 591-5191 or emailing nstrom-avila@cityoftacoma.org.

Applicants are encouraged to attend a free workshop, which explains and addresses questions about the application and funding process. The workshop will be held Oct. 9, 2014, from noon-1:30pm, in the Tacoma Municipal Building North (728 St. Helens, Room 16).

The Tacoma City Council is looking to fill four volunteer positions on the Landmarks Preservation Commission:

Architect (one position): This position is open to individuals residing in Tacoma who are currently or have in the past been professionally-certified architects.

At-Large (two positions): These positions are open to individuals with a demonstrated interest in historic preservation who are residents of Tacoma.

Professional (one position): This position is open to individuals who have had professional experience or training related to historic preservation originating from employment or study within the following disciplines: arts or art history, architecture, history, architectural history, planning, prehistoric and/or historic archaeology, conservation, construction or building trades, landscape architecture, urban planning or design, structural engineering, land use or real estate law, real estate, appraisal or real estate finance, project management or contracting, or a related discipline.

The Landmarks Preservation Commission consists of 11 members who are nominated by the Mayor and confirmed by a majority vote of the City Council. Membership is comprised of three architects, four individuals with professional expertise in preservation-related fields, one representative from the Tacoma Arts Commission, and three interested citizens. Non-voting ex-officio members may be appointed to represent property and business owners within Tacoma's historic districts.

The Commission oversees the establishment and regulation of landmarks, local historic districts, proposed name changes for public facilities, and certain property tax incentives.
